


Coordinator's Monthly Report: October 2015

Serving Langlade, Menominee, Oconto, and Shawano counties

Summary

Despite things slowing down in October, TIP attended five events and meetings; reaching approximately 1004 people over 18.3 8 hr. workdays; treated 22.6 acres for invasive species; learned of 28 new populations (and the successful elimination of 21 populations) of invasive species and reached a record number of people via the TIP Website. As TIP's Coordinator I am looking forward to the next few months as an opportunity to plan our 2016 work efforts and ensure our future success.




This chart shows TIP's total number of people reached each month.


New Invasive Species to Look For

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture and Consumer Protection (DATCP) has announced

that the invasive, fruit-devouring brown marmorated stink bugs have been found in Dane County. You are most likely to encounter this invasive species as it tries to enter your home to overwinter, much like the more familiar box elder bug.

Brown marmorated stink bugs look very similar to native stink bugs. They are shield shaped, a half inch to threequarters inch long, and are marbled ("marmorated") with different shades of brown. Their antennae have light and dark bands, which distinguishes them from other stink bug species. They have scent glands that are the source of their name.

Control


Jack Lake Ski Trails

TIP again paired up with Brigid Hanke of the Langlade County Land Conservation Department to manage invasive species. This time we covered approximately 14.4 miles (22.6 acres) of the Jack Lake Ski Trail system. While on the trail system we mapped and spot sprayed any invasive garlic mustard we discovered.

With temperatures falling, this will likely be TIP's last control event of the year. Next month we will do a brief review of all of TIP's control efforts this year.

Bass Lake Tests Negative for Zebra Mussels

On October 13th TIP received an email from Gina LaLiberte of the WDNR stating that she found no zebra mussel veliger's in water samples from Bass Lake in Oconto County. This may just be a false negative however, as the lake did test positive in 2014.

Organizational Development Planning with Partners

Funding

Lumberjack RC&D 2015 Grant

As of October 29th TIP's Lumberjack RC&D 2015 grant proposal for \$9,000 has received its first approval from the Lumberjack RC&D Council. The second (and final) approval will come in January 2016.

TIP Budgeted in Menominee County

In an effort to further support their commitment to TIP, Jeremy Johnson, the Director of the Menominee County Conservation, Forestry and Zoning Office was able to budget in \$2,500 for TIP-related expenses. The budget will receive its final formal approval later this year.
